The Bromeliad Extravaganza is a special event that is held every two years in Florida. It is sponsored by the **Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies** and hosted this year by the **Seminole Bromeliad & Tropical Plant Society**. It is the biggest Bromeliad event of 2025 in Florida and will be back in the Orlando area for the first time since 2019.

\$10 plant sale coupon (if you register by the end of August), a free ticket to enter in a drawing for extra-early access to the plant sale on Friday evening, and access to several members' gardens early Sunday afternoon.

## **Species Spotlight**

## TILLANDSIA CHIAPENSIS By Mike McMahon

Tillandsia chiapensis is one of the most frequently used species for hybridization, but not well-known by bromeliad hobbyists who do not focus on Tillandsias. It was first described by Sue Gardner in 1978. As soon as it became available, it quickly spread among Tillandsia enthusiasts because of its beauty and unique traits. It was found in an area of the Mexican state of Chiapas known as the Central Depression. This is an area

bounded by mountain ranges and composed of a number of distinct valleys. It can be very hot and the primary vegetation is inhospitable dry thorn woodland. However, during the summer the humidity soars due to the large volume of rain received in July and August. Here, on limestone canyon walls rising as much as 1,000 feet above the river below, are dense colonies of *T. chiapensis*. These colonies extend along the canyon for miles, but are not easily reached. The plants thrive in full sun. The natural bloom period is October-November following the summer wet season. Companion bromeliads

include various species of Hechtia. Also found in the vicinity are forms of *T. fasciculata* and *T. concolor*. The plants currently available commercially, however, are mostly grown in Central American nurseries under shadecloth and imported to the U.S.

T. chiapensis gained quick popularity because it is both beautiful and versatile. It thrives in bright filtered light or full sun. It can endure long dry spells and is happy with daily summer rain. Although it needs

protection from frost/freezes, low temperatures are otherwise of

no concern. The foliage is a soft silvery gray, becoming pinkish in bright light. It forms clumps, often pupping before blooming as well as afterwards. It grows well without extra fertilizer, but it also responds well to regular fertilization, doubling or tripling the rate of growth. Although

the plant can reach about 18-inches across, it is more typical for the species to be 8-12 inches across when it blooms. There are some forms that grow larger. The flower spike starts as silvery green, turning pink as it rises over a period of 4-6 weeks. Flowers emerge one by one over a period of more than a month. The spike then becomes a deep rose pink after flowering. The flowers are a dark blue, appearing nearly black when viewed from a distance. The spike retains attractive color for many months, sometimes for nearly a year.

Hybridizers have loved crossing it with nearly every other species they can get to bloom at the same time. It's hybrids generally are not as welcoming of full direct sun, but do like bright light and often can tolerate more direct sun than many Tillies, especially in cool periods of the year. The pink inflorescence color is often passed to its hybrid offspring, together with the trait of retaining color for an extended period.

For those interested in giving Tillies a try, *T. chiapensis* is a good introduction. It forgives all the hobbyist's mistakes, except putting it in deep shade.

This month's theme is to showcase any bromeliad, which is the result of a cross of two different generas. There are some really interesting crosses, resulting in unique shapes, sizes, colors, and blooms! You may not realize it, but most everyone has a cross or two in their collection.
